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

1979, and my oldest son, Drew, and I lived at #4 29th Ave.

I've wanted to publish a story about the Isle of Palms Airport for a good while now, mostly because it is part of the island's history. It's also etched in my memories of younger years – parking with friends along the runway overlooking the waterway. There are stories of adventurous pilots flying into this little-known airstrip carrying popular illegal contraband of the time. The result was a keepsake magazine called Hurricane Hugo - Storm Of The Century. We relived our experiences through the pages of this documentary. One of the stories is on pages 31 and 32 of this issue of Isle of Palms Magazine. I vividly remember the evening we sent the Hugo magazine to the printer. Finishing the publication provided a great sense of relief for our team. It was as if all of us had pushed the psychological aftermath of Hugo out our door.
